#### A Message from the Board President & Manager

"What a difference a day makes..."

Who can forget that beautiful melody and the optimistic spirit induced by hearing it? Keep humming it. We need all the optimism we can generate especially since that one day on September 11, 2017 when Irma swept through and changed our corner of the world.

We are very much saddened that the storm flooded a number of homes, placed our spring and the entire recreation area under a lake of filthy, muddy water for ten days, brought down enormous old oaks and other exotic giants, littered our streets and grounds with thousands of broken limbs, and darkened large swaths of our street lighting. In 24 hours we went from being a well-groomed resort-like setting to a gray-brown splintered mess with ominous stacks of debris.

As the days drag by and the stacks grow larger and move around but not away, your spirits flicker, too, and a sense of unease and unhappiness replaces your normal confidence that all will be well. But it's just like a wound to the body. Ugly, uncomfortable, an insult to our very being, yet little by little, day after day, despite our frowning and sighing, the wound heals up.

The SCA Office is in touch daily with Seminole County to press for trash pick-up, storm debris pick-up by FEMA-financed contractors, water quality testing, and bad rumor control. Despite an Orlando Sentinel article on 9/29 that suggested FEMA would not be helping gated communities, the SCA staff had a conference call with the county at which they assured we are indeed approved for FEMA debris collection. Here's a quick run-down of what else is being done:

Commercial Lighting was last onsite 9/29 to attempt once more to restore the streetlights at various locations around the HOA. High water and debris covering lighting junction boxes thwarted earlier attempts.

- The SCA will work with a private lab the first week of October to get the springs water tested to assure it's safe to swim in it. Until we announce it's open it would be unwise to swim in it.
- Due to the sewage stench and apparent sewage seeping from the ground at various spots, the SCA called Utilities Inc. to confirm that all 7 lift stations are working properly.
   Utilities, Inc. confirmed they were and will visit in October to demonstrate that they are.
- Waste Pro confirmed it will not pick up black bags of yard debris if they are commingled with open stacks of debris. Keep the black bags at your residence and away from the open stacks. Nor will FEMA pick up any construction material piled onto tree debris stacks.

We will get through this. In November, the SCA has approved a "Resident's Only" let's-have-fun event complete with an antique auto show, a fashion show, a silent auction, and charity fund-raiser concert at the Clubhouse. Details Inside. And remember, "when you're smilin' then the whole world smiles for you."

The Board of Directors of The Springs Community Association, Inc. met at the Clubhouse on Wednesday, September 27, 2017. Board members present were: Jerry Alexandrowicz, President; Jerry Crews, Vice President; Austin Beeghly, Secretary; and directors James Cornell, and Mark Sposato. Community Association Manager, David Forthuber, was present. Fourteen home owners also attended.

#### **CALL TO ORDER**

Noting that the meeting had been properly posted and a quorum was present, Board President Jerry Alexandrowicz called the meeting to order at 7 p.m.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT – Jerry Alexandrowicz reported that treasurer Robert Johnston is making good progress in his recovery, but sprained his ankle and was ordered to stay off of it. He and the manager met on 9/26 with Mr. Johnston at his home to go over the first draft of the 2018 budget. He noted that while the treasurer has missed three consecutive meetings, the Board is not compelled to remove him from his seat if he has a valid reason for his absence. He asked the directors for their input and they agreed to allow Mr. Johnston to continue on the Board. If Mr. Johnston is still infirm next month, Jerry Alexandrowicz will host a meeting of the Audit & Finance Committee on 10/16/17 so it can review the proposed 2018 budget. Mr. Alexandrowicz also reported that at the most recent Seminole County Commissioners Meeting the commissioners announced that debris pick-up is at least 6 weeks away. He also noted that the commissioners have agreed to file suit to stop the Utilities, Inc. rate increase approved by the Public Utility Commission.

**SECRETARY'S REPORT** – Austin Beeghly advised that the August 16, 2017 minutes have been reviewed and are accurate. *He moved to approve them. Jerry Alexandrowicz seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.* 

**TREASURER'S REPORT** – Jerry Alexandrowicz reviewed the monthly financial summary provided by Mr. Johnston. The SCA is still awaiting payment of \$205,525 in unpaid assessments; much of this is likely to come in during the final quarter. Expenditures are also below estimates, but these generally mount up in the final quarter, too, as the landscaper refreshes mulch and palms everywhere are trimmed. The SCA had \$1,006,802 in its operating fund on 8/31/17. Monthly expenditures have averaged \$126,833 year-to-date.

**MANAGEMENT REPORT** – The manager reviewed highlights of his report for members attending and noted, as an update, that Seminole County has one final request regarding the fence's capacity to handle windspeed before it provides the permit. The designer is adding this detail to the drawings and will send them to the permitting unit.

**COMMITTEE REPORTS** – None of the directors had questions about the committee reports.

MEMBERS OPEN FORUM: Tom & Charlotte Jessen and Diana Harms, all from Lost Spring Court, asked the Board to have the SCA build a common fence to replace the existing fence panels behind 17 homes which had been brought down and weakened by Hurricane Irma. They suggested that the fence be considered a security issue rather than a privacy issue since it barricades against the commercial common grounds on 434. Jerry Alexandrowicz advised that the existing fence was on their lots and the SCA would need an easement from each lot owner before the SCA had any legal right to install anything. Other directors noted that it might be more expensive for owners to get a lawyer to create an easement than it would be to erect three panels of fencing on their own. The manger will discuss the easement prospect with the HOA's attorney. Mike & Tracy Gore spoke about the storm floodwaters which rose 20" inside their home. They feel that the current set of under-road conduits must be replaced by a bridge so that the water flows more fully toward the drain fields and that the drain fields might need to be dredged to better accommodate flooding.

#### MEMBERS OPEN FORUM (Cont'd)

The manager and the board's president will meet with them in a few weeks after contacting SJRWMD administrators to learn what might be truly effective and permissible.

#### **OLD BUSINESS:**

• Mr. Alexandrowicz noted that the Board last month requested that Claire Schwartz address several issues of concern relative to her proposal to stage an antique car show, fashion show, silent auction for charity and a 3 hour concert on Saturday, November 4. The events would be open only to Springs residents and their invited guests. Concert tickets to see Elvis Wade perform standards from Elvis, Roy Orbison, Gary Puckett and others would be \$15, a portion of which would also go to charity. Austin Beeghly confirmed that Ms. Schwartz had addressed their concerns about liability insurance, crowd control, and clean-up. Jerry Alexandrowicz moved to permit the event to go forward. Austin Beeghly seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

- ♦ Jerry Crews moved to accept the proposal by Welch Creative Lighting to maintain all of the decorative lighting at the entry lanes and along 434 for \$1600/yr with a 20% discount for repair parts. Mark Sposato seconded the motion with a revision requesting that the contract price be locked in for a 3-year period. The revised motion passed unanimously.
- Austin Beeghly withdrew from consideration his agenda items to consider purchase of a tractor or a hydraulic lift trailer. He has decided that rental of these items is the better course at present.
- ♦ The manager distributed a first draft of the 2018 Budget to the directors. They have until Oct 16 to make revision requests at which time the Audit & Finance Committee will also review it. The Budget Adoption meeting is scheduled for October 18, 2017.

Legal Issues (C & M - Clayton & McCulloh; KG - Katzman & Chandler; AB - Arias/Bosinger)

Atty Michael McCoy will soon contact directors sitting on the Board in 2013 when Mr. Rotroff was injured in a diving accident at the boil. He will be setting up a date and place at which they can be deposed for the trial at which his injury claim against the SCA will be considered by jurors.

#### **Administrative Office Projects**

- Seminole County's Board of Adjustment on 8/28 approved the height waiver request for the Markham Wds Road fence and its approval letter was posted 9/19 on the website for permit applications. The contractor is expecting the permit by 9/29. The manager also obtained a renewal of the permit to install electric and water at the construction site which is valid through 12/31.
- The spa gazebo renovation is 65% complete. The raw wood will be painted before adding shingles, the shingles will likely be added by 9/30, and electrical devices added shortly after. Mr. Alexandrowicz requested several revisions to the wood-work prior to painting to assure solid reconstruction.
- The SERV program of volunteers has postponed the hydrilla harvesting event at the spring until November. The county wants to provide sufficient time for the spring to neutralize any toxic impurities introduced by the flood waters of the Little Wekiva River. The manager has asked for their assistance in testing for e coli bacteria to establish an "all safe" rating before opening the spring to use by community residents.
- The manager, Bill Eggers, Mr. Alexandrowicz, and Mr. Crews met with engineer Mark Flint to discuss how the SCA could obtain funding to improve our system for removing algae and other plant material from the spring without dumping it into the Little Wekiva. Resident Bill Eggers has initiated the application process to obtain up to \$50,000 for hydrilla containment. The funds come from license plate revenue for auto tags promoting Florida's rivers and springs.
- Parker Wilson commenced dredging of 2200 linear feet of canals that drain lots along Wisteria Drive on 9/7/17 and cleared approximately a third of it prior to the arrival of Irma. He removed 9 large tree logs and greatly increased the flow of the cleared areas. Unfortunately, much of the effort was un-done when a retention pond wall in Sabal Point collapsed during Irma and spilled enormous quantities of water and mud into the canals. Fortunately, his large grappling vehicles were still onsite to assist in fallen tree removal 9/11/17 through 9/22/17.
- To date, over 6 days, the damaged tree removal and roadside storage has cost the SCA \$18,000. Parker Wilson and Robert Brinton are each charging a day rate of \$1500 which is well below the typical per tree rate. Both contractors are using a sizable crew and have rented heavy equipment to get the job done. FEMA contractors will have access to the community to remove the debris; the manager filed paperwork early in the summer to assure their services.

The process will likely require weeks of visitation by these crews. Residents are urged to pile debris, as much as possible, away from irrigation and utility lines because the large claw devices that will pick up the debris may well dig below the ground's surface.

- The manager had civil engineer Harry Brumley assess the stability of the Woodbridge vehicle bridge. Stress cracks in the water flumes adjacent to the bases of the bridge enlarged after flood water eroded the soil beneath the flumes, causing them to drop. There is also minor erosion under the bridge bases and the engineer will make some recommendations to address it and to prevent erosion in the future. He advised that the flumes themselves should be rebuilt with new materials and enlarged and repositioned to push water to the center of the river. He will work up cost projections.
- Mr. Brumley also assessed the pedestrian bridge downstream from the vehicle bridge. Erosion of the bank caused the left
  base to drop several feet and that side of the bridge is now two feet lower than the right side of the bridge and it is also
  twisted downward. The base will have to be demolished, pile support driven into a more solid substrate, and a wall of composite material built out to redirect water away from the base. He will work out cost projections.
- Mr. Brumley recommended that the SCA contact the SJRWMD and, if necessary, a consultant to advise on dredging the Little
  Wekiva and constructing a composite wall driven into substrate to prevent further erosion along a considerable stretch of
  the river bank.
- The tennis courts and buildings were underwater for a week. Portions of the back side of the courts have broken away, but the courts do not appear to have suffered an upheaval as originally feared. Insurance Office of America will visit on 9/26 to see if a claim can be made; water damage is an exclusion. The manager will have the courts pressure cleaned and then have Nidy Sports Construction visit regarding repair and possible resurfacing. John Rountree has completely cleaned the interior of the tennis shop which was under 18 inches of water. A new AC unit will be required; flood water ruined the existing unit.
- The manager is tracking all Irma related damage expenses by use of a single accounting code so that the community can file a claim as a non-profit organization for disaster relief funds now available for Central Florida communities.
- A preliminary draft of the 2018 budget will be made available to the Board on 9/27 so that directors and the Audit & Finance Committee can review it for a month and weigh in on next year's allocations. No assessment increase is planned. The October meeting (10/18/17) will have budget adoption for 2018 as its principle item of business.



#### Tennis Facility...

The tennis facility, as you may imagine, took quite a beating. Although it's been closed for several days, the tennis facility (at least two of the courts) is nearly ready for play again, and will be open for business for the upcoming Junior Tennis Clinics beginning on October 11th, and Adult Tennis Clinics beginning October 13th.

Pick-Up Day: Beginning 9/15 No limit

Curbside, please do not place large debris on driveways, in yards, or on the street. Large debris can be bundled with rope, please do not bag. Place away from utility boxes, fire hydrants, mailboxes, and avoid placing under power lines.

Following these guidelines will expedite pick-up and permit the use of heavier equipment.

Due to the magnitude of debris county-wide, multiple contractors have been engaged to expedite this process. Seminole County Government appreciates your patience, as it will take several weeks to accomplish



Architectural Review Committee Construction Criteria

For a copy of the complete Application and Policy, Please Contact the Business Office

The Springs Community Association's (SCA) Declaration of Covenants and Restrictions provide for the review, by committee, of any and all phases of exterior modifications to lots and/or living units within The Springs Planned Unit Development (PUD). This includes but is not limited to painting, roofing, paving, landscaping, fencing, and additions to or deletions from existing structures. The intent of the overall community scheme is to insure a standard of construction, which, over the years, will enhance the appearance of the community as a whole. Each structure and lot upon which it sits is to be considered an element of the community and should blend appropriately with its surroundings. It is intended that this development maintains itself with as many natural surfaces as possible.

#### **REVIEW**

The following documents and criteria are established for review by the ACC prior to commencement of any phase of construction. Plans are requested seven days in advance of the regularly scheduled meeting of the ACC so that the site may be reviewed by committee members prior to the meeting. The General Manager will provide approvals, disapprovals, or requests for additional information in writing.

An "Architectural Review" application form describing work to be done submitted with drawings and documents or survey as required.

#### Must have written sub-association approval (if applicable).

Plans for structures will be not less than 1/8" = 1' scale.

Drawings and documents required for review shall consist of the following:

Survey prepared by a Florida registered surveyor. Additions such as decks, porches, rooms, pools require a survey showing placement of these structures.

Site plan showing all lot dimensions, easements, outlines, setbacks, major trees over 6" in diameter, fences, existing and proposed topographic conditions, and underground trench locations at a scale of not less than 1"=20'.

Floor plans

Elevations of all sides of contemplated structure. Height limitations in single-family residences will be 2.5 stories or 35 feet.

A summary specification list of proposed materials. Samples must be supplied for all exterior materials, which cannot be adequately described.

Color samples for all proposed exterior materials.

Landscape plans complete with a tree survey.

Approvals will be good for six months unless otherwise specified.

Any permits required by Seminole County must be obtained before contractor's passes are issued.

All contractors must be properly licensed and insured.

#### **SUMMARY**

The property owner is responsible for and is fully expected to control noise and unsightliness (to include any and all debris) during all phases of construction. The property owner and contractors will provide dust abatement and erosion control measures. Construction is prohibited on Sundays and limited to daylight hours on every other day of the week. Respect for neighboring properties and the rights of other property owners is fully expected.

Written approval from village or sub-association (if applicable)
Construction deposit
Seminole County approved plans


